
Seuss on the Loose

Brief Description

You will read a collection of Dr. Seuss books and determine the theme of the story. Even though Seuss is using wild characters and creatures, what point is the author trying to get at, also looking at Seuss's use of rhyme to tell a story.



Product

After finding the theme of several of his books, you will apply it to a situation in your own life and similar situations you might face. You will eventually write your own Dr. Seuss-like book that shows this theme.

Brief Description

They say everyone has a story to tell and you will tell the one about your life. This will include your family history, a timeline of important events in your own personal history, how your family came to be in Ohio, and events that have shaped who you are.



Product

You will write an autobiography that chronicles your life. You may want to include a timeline that shows the history of your family and/or a family tree that indicates the family lineage.

What If Cinderella had Gold Slippers Instead of Glass Ones?



Brief Description

Folktales have been around for hundreds of years but different cultures have different variations on the same story. For instance, in the Disney version of Cinderella she has a magical fairy godmother. In the Iraq version the godmother is in the form of a red fish while in the Egyptian version it is a god. What do these stories indicate about the culture they come from? You will read an American folktale and compare it to the version from a foreign country, analyzing what the events, characters, and moral indicate about the country it was written in.

Product

You will write an analysis comparing the US version to the foreign one, saying what the differences say about the differences in the cultures. You might even want to rewrite the folktale to give it a Reynoldsburg or Ohio perspective.



Brief Description

Here you will look at a body of work by the same author. You might want to compare two or three of the "Harry Potter" books by J. K. Rowling, or look at Judy Blume's "Superfudge" as compared to "Tales of the Fourth Grade Nothing". The idea is to compare multiple works by the same author.



Product

A paper or a posterboard that compares three or more works by the same author, looking at the similarities and differences in them.

Have you ever wondered what happened to characters after a book ends? Does their story continue even if a sequel does not come out? Here you will take a book or



character and continue the story, predicting what might happen in the future.

You will write a short story that continues the original story, showing what might happen to the characters after the book ends.

Brief Description

People have developed different methods for learning vocabulary words. Some like to use lists, others index cards, while others use listening practices.



Product

You will develop a book or game to teach people how to learn their vocabulary words. You should include instructions, worksheets, vocabulary lists, and any other materials one would need to use your method.

Create Your Own Illustrated Thesaurus

Brief Description

A Thesaurus is a reference book that provides the synonyms (words that are similar) and antonyms (words that are the opposite) of words. The problem is that Thesaurus' are so large that carrying one around and using it in class is not very practical.

Product

You will create a Thesaurus for commonly used words you use in your everyday life and class. Your Thesaurus should contain at least 50 words with 5 synonyms and 2 antonyms for each entry. Included with each entry should be two illustrations, one that shows the synonym, one the antonym. You can personalize your own Thesaurus to include slang words and other terms not found in a regular Thesaurus. You should not just copy the words from a Thesaurus but work on figuring out the synonyms and antonyms yourself, checking to make sure your information is correct.

Mad Homonyms

Brief Description

Madlibs is a humorous book where you fill in the blanks and then read the passage, laughing at the funny results. Homonyms are a word with different origin and meaning but the same oral or written form as one or more other words, as *bear* (an animal) vs. *bear* (to support) vs. *bare* (exposed). Homonyms include homophones and homographs. Homophones are words



that have a similar sound but are spelled differently with different meanings. For instance, if you **read** the book, could you also **red** the book? Homographs have the exact same spelling but different meanings, for example you write with a **pen** and you can also keep a pig in a **pen**. There are also homonyms

Product

You will write very short stories where at least ten words in the passage have the wrong homonym, which makes the passage funny. You will offer a blank so that people reading the passage can correct the homonym, causing the story to make more sense. Example: Tom was **board** ______ in class. If Tom was really board, he would be made of wood. Tom would really be **bored** in class.



Brief Description

When you buy a new computer, a board game, or even something as simple as an alarm clock, it comes with a set of directions or a manual to tell the buyer how to use it.



Product

You will choose an object that requires a manual or direction to how to use or even how to put it together. You will write a set of directions in your manual and accompany these with pictures or illustrations to show visual people how these directions work.



Who Needs Spark Notes When You Have Your Own?

Brief Description

Spark Notes are a summary of a book so that people either do not have to read the entire book, or if they need to review that can use the notes instead of rereading the entire book.



Product

Here you will create you own summary choosing a novel or short story you would like to summarize. You summary should include:

- identify the main incidents of plot of each chapter
- major characters
- describe the influence of setting
- identify the major conflict
- explain how the author suggests a mood

Can include illustrations of scenes if you like. Someone should be able to read your notes and get a good idea of what they story is about and who is involved.

Magnetic Poetry is taking magnetic words and arranging them into a poem. Prefixes are an affix attached before a base word or root, as *re*- in *reprint* while a suffix is an affix attached to the end of a base, root or stem that changes the meaning or grammatical function of a word, as *-en* added to form *oxen*.



Product

Here you will make your own list of words so that people can arrange them and make new words using prefixes and suffixes. You will need to include 100 root words, 50 prefixes, and 50 suffixes. You can create games or riddles for people to play using their word choices.



Everything is Becoming So Tiny, but English Has Been Doing It for Years

Brief Description

As the world gets more advanced in technology, the smaller the technology gets and more convenient. A computer used to take up an entire room but now it can be put on a device that fits on your lap and weigh less than five pounds. English also has a method for making things smaller and convenient called abbreviations. Abbreviations can save a lot of time and space. There are common abbreviations that everyone recognizes such as b/c for because, US for the United States, and abbr. for abbreviations.

You are to take a short story and make a smaller version of it, rewriting the story using abbreviations, symbols, and other methods to shorten the story into a miniature version someone could carry in their pocket without taking any words out or rearranging it.


A Thousand Words Can Be Worth a Single Picture




