Brief Description

Maps serve a very specific purpose whether it be to help someone locate something, to help with planning, or to make one familiar with their surroundings.



Product

You will create a scale map of the neighborhood and its surroundings. You will include things such as landmarks, a scale, compass rose, and other features found on most maps. You will have to learn what these features are and then translate them into a map that correctly represents your neighborhood. The map may be made of anything you choose but an explanation or legend must be provided.







Supply and Demand

Brief Description

What makes a baseball card worth more than another? What are some items considered collectables while others called junk? How do we determine what products will be a success and which ones not so much?

Product

You will study the economic concept of supply and demand and how it causes the economy to go round and round. You may also look at collectibles such as trading cards, dolls, toys, etc. to see what trends supply and demand cause.

Brief Description

Product

Look into this culture and why they live the way they do. It is a way of life you think you could do yourself? Come up with a demonstration or skit of how the Amish live compared to your own life. Try living like someone from the Amish culture for a single day and analyze how different your life is from theirs.

Brief Description

Product

You will choose an election either local or state and evaluate the candidate running for the position. What are their qualifications and do they have what it takes to be a good leader? Also look at the election process and determine if this is the best way to determine a qualified leader? If there a better way you can create? You will analyze this and present it to the class.

Explain why elections are used to select leaders and decide issues. Explain why characteristics such as respect for the rights of others, fairness, reliability, honesty, wisdom, and courage are desirable qualities in the people citizens select as their leaders.

Scrapping Time

Brief Description

Time happens in a very linear fashion, going from day to day, month to month, years to year, and so on. It is almost like you are reading it in a book.

Scrapbooks capture the memories of people using pictures, captions, and other objects.

Product

You will select an historical event or time period and create a scrapbook that chronicles this using a pictorial timeline. You will need to explain what the events are and why they are important to the event. Use you creativity to dress the pages up and bring them to life.
